MD White Coat Ceremony is a Rite of Passage for New Students



Members of the MD Class of 2028 took their first steps as future physicians by participating in this year's White Coat Ceremony on August 16. As each student's name was called, department chairs helped them don their white coats for the first time on the stage at Harrison Opera House.

"Today's ceremony affirms the vision and the core values we hold dearly in medicine: professionalism, integrity, compassion, empathy and dedication," said Alfred Abuhamad, MD, executive vice president of Macon & Joan Brock Virginia Health Sciences at

ODU, dean of EVMS and the Mason C. Andrews Distinguished Professor in Obstetrics and Gynecology.

More than 7,600 people applied to be in the MD Class of 2028, but only 151 were chosen. Among those students, half are from Virginia, including 30 from Hampton Roads. This was the first class to receive their white coats as part of Macon & Joan Brock Virginia Health Sciences Eastern Virginia Medical School at Old Dominion University.

ODU Renews Commitment to The National GEM Consortium

As ODU is among an elite group of schools having earned Research 1 Classification from the Carnegie

Classification of Institutions of Higher Education, it continues to expand opportunities for its top students. One such opportunity is ODU's membership in The National GEM Consortium (GEM) which aims to increase the participation of underrepresented student groups at the master's and doctoral levels in engineering and science. The consortium includes more than 120 of the top universities in the country and more than 75 employer members like NASA, IBM, Apple, SpaceX and Intel that seek to enhance their workforces with the best and the brightest.



The GEM Fellowship provides opportunities for graduate students to enter the engineering and science workforces in areas such as research and development, product development and other advanced technical and research careers within the private sector, as well as with federal national laboratories and agencies. Since its founding in 1976, more than 5,000 students had their graduate education funded through the program and are working as entrepreneurs, inventors, research scientists and business leaders throughout the country.

'Monarchs Give Back' Through Annual Community Food Drive

On August 30, ODU launch[ed] its university-wide "Monarchs Give Back" community food drive — an annual initiative that tackles food insecurity in Hampton Roads.

President Brian O. Hemphill, Ph.D., and First Lady Marisela Hemphill, Ph.D., have challenged students, faculty and community volunteers to collect 40,000 non-perishable items, or equivalent monetary donations, by October 18. Donations will support children in Norfolk Public Schools, students who use the ODU Monarch Pantry, and the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia and the Eastern Shore.

This year, donation collection sites have expanded to two locations — ODU main campus at the Monarchs Give Back Headquarters located in 1544 Webb Center and at the Macon & Joan Brock Virginia Health Sciences at ODU campus in

Waitzer, Hofheimer, Andrews, Lewis, Lester, and Williams Halls.

Looking at Big Investments in AI? There Are Big Considerations



The costs for tech companies to bring in new artificial intelligence technology is in the billions, according to reporting by *The New York Times*. Helen Crompton, executive director of the Research Institute of Digital Innovation in Learning, said AI can be a useful tool for success. There is a rush to adopt this technology as it "promises transformative potential," but there is still a need to carefully consider the best way to move forward to see the best return on investment.

AI can be useful in automating or enhancing

certain processes, Crompton said. The technology could be used to automate or enhance data analysis. This benefit to the business could lead to better decision-making and ultimately lead to savings down the road. Additionally, studies have shown workers using the technology need to know how to use it effectively, and there needs to be training.

The companies seeing the greatest profits from jumping into AI are not necessarily the tech companies, but the AI strategists advising companies on how to use these technologies. Crompton notes an example of Accenture, a consulting firm, which earned \$3.6 billion from generative AI consulting alone.

BAM Unveils Full-Size Dollhouse

Just as the Bauhaus art movement married various artistic styles together under one roof, the Barry Art Museum's latest exhibition, "Dollhaus: Reimagining the Domestic Space," will showcase the diverse contributions of ODU's Department of Art with a full-size dollhouse installation.

Sixteen artists created different rooms for the dollhouse – from bedrooms to formal dining rooms to nurseries – applying techniques in glass, textiles and painting. This collaborative artwork also responds to museum co-founder Carolyn Barry's



dollhouse - an exquisite recreation of the interior of their home featuring miniature versions of the Barry's and their artworks - which will be featured alongside the new dollhouse in the exhibition.

The exhibition will be on view through January 5, 2025. In addition to the dollhouses, the exhibition will include several 19th-century artworks. One is a novelty porcelain doll created by French artist Jacob Petit (1796-1868) whose skirt opens to reveal a kitchen.


