ODU Ranked as a Top Institution by U.S. News & World Report



For the seventh consecutive year, ODU is recognized in the 2025 U.S. News & World Report rankings as a top institution among 1,500 national colleges and universities, and a top ten university in Virginia.

The University saw gains in two key programs: Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs and Bachelor of Science in Computer Science programs.

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs are a key component of Macon & Joan Brock Virginia Health Sciences at ODU, recently established following the

integration of Eastern Virginia Medical School [and] provide hands-on learning in clinical settings for students, expand health research opportunities and create a talent pipeline for the Hampton Roads healthcare workforce and beyond.

The University's status as the region's only Carnegie R1 institution, recognized for its high level of research activity, is further enhanced by its undergraduate computer science programs. Facilitating research projects with faculty in leading industry areas like artificial intelligence, cybersecurity and machine learning, these programs position students and faculty to be at the forefront of innovation and big data.

ODU's Division of Research and Economic Development, in collaboration with Academic Affairs, has launched a new initiative to support the University's mission to provide an experiential learning environment for undergraduate students. The new Office for Undergraduate Research will serve as a hub for developing

a strong undergraduate research system, working with faculty, staff and students already involved in this kind of work.

Orlando Ayala, a professor in the Department of Engineering Technology, and Anne Perrotti, an associate professor in the Department of Human Movement Studies and Special Education, form an interdisciplinary leadership team that will bolster and facilitate ODU's undergraduate research culture. The two will serve as the inaugural director and associate director of undergraduate research, respectively.

ODU will host a series of open forums this fall as part of its General Education Reform Initiative: Reimagining the Future of General Education Together. The first two forums – one in-person and one virtual – will provide opportunities for the ODU community to reflect on the University's mission and goals, share input and join in the discussion. The final forum will be a



panel discussion and Q&A with members of the six groups who were tasked with researching components of general education. The General Education Reform Initiative is a multiyear, campus-wide undertaking involving students, faculty and staff. Feedback will be gathered and considered through surveys, department and program meetings, focus groups and forums like these.

Dragas Center to Release Its 25th State of the Region Report

ODU's 25th annual State of the Region Report ... will note that while Hampton Roads is experiencing steady economic progress, there is plenty of room for job growth in the private sector.

"For the first time in almost two decades, the regional economy grew in four consecutive years. A record



number of individuals were in the civilian labor force and employed, and employers reported a record number of jobs. Job growth, however, lagged our peers," said Robert McNab, chair of the Department of Economics and director of the Dragas Center for Economic Analysis & Policy in the Strome College of Business.

The annual report is intended as a service to decision makers and thought leaders in Hampton Roads, inserting data into discussions that affect our daily lives. In addition to McNab, Vinod Agarwal, professor of economics and deputy director of the Dragas Center, will speak.

The events, which require preregistration, are scheduled for <u>noon Oct. 8 at the Norfolk Waterside</u> <u>Marriott</u> and <u>8 a.m. Oct. 11 at the Newport News-Hampton Holiday Inn</u>.

Since 2000, the Dragas Center's State of the Region Report has been an October fixture. After the October 8 event in Norfolk, this year's State of the Region Report will be available <u>ONLINE</u>, along with every other report produced by the Dragas Center.

2024 Life in Hampton Roads Survey: Politics and Political Opinions



A survey of Hampton Roads residents shows some evidence that President Joe Biden's decision to drop out of the 2024 presidential race may not have been a boon for Democrats' chances of victory in this November's election. Identification with major political parties has also dipped since 2020 and winning over independent voters could prove crucial for Virginia's election outcomes.

Those are among the findings in the 2024 Life in Hampton Roads Survey regarding politics and political opinions. This is one of the chapters in the 15th annual

edition of the survey conducted by ODU's Social Science Research Center.

A total of 640 telephone surveys were completed between June 4 and August 16. The political section of the survey focused on four topics: baseline party identification and ideology; the Senate race; the presidential election; and election security. In the final section of the survey, more than 80% of respondents indicated they were very or somewhat satisfied with election security at their polling place and less than 5% of respondents reported being intimidated by someone at their polling place in the past 10 years.

From Tragedy to Triumph: Norfolk Couple Establishes \$2 Million Endowment for the Faschini Wallach Center for Restorative Therapies



It was December 2019 and Andy Wallach was in a Florida hospital after suffering traumatic injuries during an accident in an All-Terrain Vehicle. Doctors told his wife, Cynthia Faschini, that he would never walk again and that he had no better than a 50 percent chance of living a year.

Almost five years later, Andy is still very much alive and kicking, as was clearly apparent ... when ODU dedicated a portion of the Ellmer College of Health Sciences building as the Faschini Wallach Center for Restorative Therapies. Andy walked – with the aid of a walker – with Faschini by his side as they

stepped to the podium to dedicate the multispecialty rehabilitation center formerly known as ODU Monarch Physical Therapy.

The center was named for the Norfolk couple after they established a \$2 million endowment for the Faschini Wallach Center for Restorative Therapies. Funds from the endowment will be used to supplement the services that patients now receive.

Galleries Curator Brings Breadth of Folklore Expertise to Old Dominion



The new curator and director of the Baron and Ellin Gordon Art Galleries, Jasper Waugh-Quasebarth, brings to Old Dominion University a stockpile of knowledge that's easy to admire and hard to categorize.

As a folklorist and anthropologist, Waugh-Quasebarth has conducted research with global reach, studying musical instrument makers of Appalachia, placemaking in post-coal economies, and crafts and the creative economy in Central Asia. He worked two years as program manager for the Asian Cultural History Program of the Smithsonian Institution.

He's won a list of teaching awards and given lectures at Cambridge University in England and Meiji University in Japan. However, he's no stranger to Virginia. Waugh-Quasebarth studied anthropology and history at the University of Virginia, then headed to the University of Kentucky, where he earned both a master's and a doctorate in anthropology. He worked as a postdoctoral scholar and public folklorist at The Ohio State University before being hired as director of the university's Center for Folklore Studies.

Eastern Shore artist and pastor Mary Elizabeth "MAMA-Girl" Onley attracted an enthusiastic flock of fans and followers. Many found inspiration in her colorful newspaper sculptures and paintings, and in her uplifting personality.

Six years after Onley's death, ODU presents an exhibition celebrating her joyful artistic vision. "MAMA-Girl!" will be on display at the Baron and Ellin Gordon Art Galleries ... through May 10, 2025.

More than a dozen lenders from Virginia, Maryland and



North Carolina contributed some 150 objects that represent her life and work. MAMA-Girl depicted a vivid, whimsical world of plants and animals, scenes from the Bible and rural life on the Eastern Shore. The work radiates imagination and optimism. One of the region's most beloved folk artists, MAMA-Girl inspires a deep sense of connection among art lovers. In the spring, the Gordon Galleries will release a catalogue documenting the exhibition, featuring object photography by Mark Atkinson.

Pneuhaus: The Fourth Annual Public Arts Festival @ ODU

October 11 – 12, 2024 | 6 pm – 10 pm | **FREE**

Over two consecutive nights, the campus will be transformed as visitors encounter immersive artworks, hands-on activities, food trucks, and more. For this year's festival, the Barry Art Museum is partnering with Pneuhaus, an art design studio based in Rhode Island. Specializing in the reimagining of public space through interactive environments, Pneuhaus creates immersive, inflatable sculptures inspired by physics, biology, and craft. Each work represents a distinct biosphere, with each piece engaging the natural world through their form and function.

This year's festival will feature three distinct biomes from Pneuhaus. Inside the museum, visitors can encounter Cloud Lights. Suspended from the museum balcony, these abstract forms channel the forms of moving clouds while their constantly changing lights turn the museum foyer into a rainbow of light. Outside the museum, visitors can interact



with two different biomes. Fabric Prism takes inspiration from caves and invites visitors to immerse themselves in a light-filled shelter. The second outdoor work, Canopy, represents a grove of tree-like sculptures. By riding bicycle-powered generators, visitors can transform the grove opening and closing its branches and changing its lighting. Through this engagement, visitors can not only take part in Canopy's kinetic qualities but can also experience first-hand the power of green electricity production.

The Environmental Corridor transforms the streets around our Museum into an outdoor sanctuary; visitors can engage with <u>Back Bay Amateur Astronomers</u>, the <u>Institute for Coastal Adaptation and</u> <u>Resilience</u>, <u>Norfolk Botanical Garden</u>, <u>ODU Libraries</u>, <u>ODU's Society of Physics Students</u>, the <u>Ocean and Earth Sciences Graduate Student Organization</u>, the <u>Old Dominion University Center for Coastal Physical</u> <u>Oceanography</u>, Hands-On Beekeepers, and more!
